
What the ladybird heard

- Can you create pictures of different animals using textured materials?
- Gather lots of leaves and try to arrange them to make a picture. Look at the work
 of Andy Goldsworthy to find more examples of how nature can be used to make
 art. Use these as inspiration to make your own
- Design a new outfit for the scarecrow in the farmer's field
- Design a new rosette for the prize cow
- Draw a map of the farm

Make a moveable ladybird out of 2 paper plates, one painted black, the other

red. Cut the top off the red plate and then cut the remainder bit in half. Decorate with black spots. Hinge these 'wings' onto the black plate using a split pin and give the ladybird a face (see pictures)



- Make a ladybird suncatcher out of black card and red tissue paper (picture)
